such place or places as aforesaid, they are hereby required, immediately thereupon, to give information thereof to the Intendant and Wardens of the said town.

*And be it further ordained by the authority aforesaid, That all and every owner or tenant of such house or houses, places or enclosures, after being duly summoned to appear before the Intendant and Wardens, and upon a conviction of each and every such offence, as is prohibited by this ordinance, shall be subject to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars. Provided nevertheless, That if any person or persons shall erect or build such a building or buildings within the limits of the said town, in which gun-powder may be lodged or deposited, without endangering the said town, or the property of any of the citizens thereof, and to be approved by the said fire-masters and the Intendant and Wardens, that then such building or buildings shall exempt the proprietors or owners who have gun-powder deposited therein, from the fines by this ordinance imposed, except as before excepted.*

No. 58.—AN ORDINANCE,

To regulate the working on the Streets of the Town of Columbia.

*Be it ordained by the Intendant and Wardens of the town of Columbia, in Council assembled, That every male inhabitant, subject or liable to work on the streets of said town, shall, on the payment of three dollars to the town marshal, on or before the first day of August next, be exempted from such said work, until the first Monday in April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one.*

*And be it further ordained by the authority aforesaid, That all and every owner of a slave or slaves, or persons, under whose control, or in whose hire a slave or slaves may be, as are subject to work on the streets of said town, shall, on payment of three dollars to the town marshal, for each and every such slave, on or before the first day of August next, be exempted, as regards such slave or slaves from such said work, until the first Monday in April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one.*

*Be it further ordained by the authority aforesaid, That all*

and every such person or persons, who, and from whom the said sum of three dollars is or shall not be paid as regards themselves and slaves aforesaid, shall work on the said streets as many days as the law hath heretofore required, and that a fine of two dollars per day shall be paid by every such person or persons, and for his or her slave or slaves, who shall neglect or fail to work as aforesaid, when duly summoned and thereunto required.

No. 59.—AN ORDINANCE,

To regulate the working on the Streets in the town of Columbia.

*Be it ordained by the Intendant and municipal Wardens of the town of Columbia, in Council assembled, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, That every white male inhabitant, subject or liable to work on the streets of said town, shall, on the payment of two dollars to the town marshal, on or before the first day of July next, be exempted from such said work, until the first Monday in April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two.*

*And be it further ordained by the authority aforesaid, That all and every owner of a slave or slaves, or persons under whose control, or in whose hire, a slave or slaves may be, as are subject to work on the streets of said town, shall, on payment of two dollars, be exempted as regards such slave or slaves from such said work, until the first Monday of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two.*

*And be it further ordained by the authority aforesaid, That all and every person or persons, who, and from whom the said sum of two dollars is or shall not be paid, as regards themselves and slaves aforesaid, shall work on the said streets as many days as the law has heretofore required; and that a fine of two dollars per day shall be paid by every such person or persons, and for his or her slave or slaves, who shall neglect or fail to work as aforesaid, when duly summoned and thereunto required.*

*Ratified in Council assembled, this 28th day of April, Anno Domini, 1821.*
