Presiding Officer, shall be expelled from the Council by a concurrent vote of two-thirds of the members elected thereto.

EXPULSION OF MEMBERS.

Sec. 13. That any member of the Council who shall be guilty of any misfeasance, nonfeasance or malfeasance in office, shall be expelled by a concurrent vote of the members elected thereto, and in addition, upon conviction thereof before the Mayor, shall be fined in any sum not less than fifty dollars and be imprisoned not more than thirty days, either or both in the discretion of the Mayor, and pay the costs of prosecution.

FINE.

Sec. 14. That any person, not a Councilman, who shall be guilty of disorderly conduct in the Council Chamber, who shall threaten personal violence to any Councilman, in relation to his official conduct, or resist or in any manner impede the Sergeant-at-Arms in a lawful discharge of his official duty, shall, upon conviction thereof before the Mayor, be fined in any sum not more than fifty dollars, and be imprisoned for any time not more than thirty days, either or both in the discretion of the Mayor, and pay the costs of prosecution.

Sec. 15. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and two publications.

REGULAR MEETINGS.

(Passed April 30, 1883.)

Sec. 16. (As amended February 22, 1892.) That from and after the taking effect of this ordinance, the regular meetings of said Council shall be held on the first and third Mondays in each and every month.

Sec. 17. That all ordinances or resolutions conflicting with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 18. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CRIMES.

(Passed November 26, 1883.)

TOY PISTOLS.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Newark, Ohio, That no person shall fire or discharge any pistol, manufactured out

CONCEALED WEAPONS, PENALTY.

(Passed April 11, 1871.)

Sec. 91. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Newark, Ohio, That whoever shall carry a weapon or weapons concealed on or about his person, such as a pistol, bowie-knife, dirk, slung-shot, brass or iron knuckles, or any other dangerous weapon, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than ten nor more than two hundred dollars, or be imprisoned not more than sixty days, or both, for each and every offense, at the discretion of the Mayor.

MAY CARRY WEAPON, WHEN.

Sec. 92. Exception. If it shall be proved to the Mayor, (or to the jury, if there be a jury trial,) from the testimony on the trial of any case presented under the first section of this ordinance, that the accused was, at the time of carrying any of the weapon or weapons aforesaid, engaged in the pursuit of any lawful business, calling or employment, and that the circumstances in which he was placed at the time aforesaid were such as to justify a prudent man in carrying the weapon or weapons aforesaid, for the defense of his person, property or family, the accused shall be acquitted.

ASSAULT AND BATTERY.

Sec. 93. That if any person shall unlawfully strike, beat or wound another, the person so offending, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than three nor more than one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned for any time not exceeding six months, either or both, at the discretion of the Mayor.

OBSTRUCTIONS IN STREET.

Sec. 94. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to permit his, her or their wood, coal, lumber, boxes, or any other obstruction whatever, by him or her or them made, or caused to be made, to remain upon any of the streets, alleys, sidewalks or public grounds of said City, for a period of time longer than twelve hours.

REFUSE IN STREET.

Sec. 95. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to conduct into any street or gutter any kitchen slops or water, or deposit or permit to be deposited upon any street, alley, sidewalk or public ground, or in any sewer or gutter, any ashes, broken glass, crockery or tinware, grass, weeds, hay, straw, brush, waste paper, or any other refuse or garb-
