Masked balls.

Sub. § 10. To bury any dead body in any portion of the grounds known as Winchester Cemetery. And it shall be the duty of the Chief of Police to cause the immediate removal of any dead body, and the reburial of the same in a proper manner in some established burial ground, or in such other place as he and the President of the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners may designate for the purpose.

Sub. § 11. To entice or attempt to entice away from any business house any one trading therein or entering therein, or to enter into any business house, or stand on the street or sidewalk in front of any business house, for the purpose of enticing any one therefrom.¹

Sub. § 12. For any person to give a masked ball in this District without having obtained a written permit for the same from the President of the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners.

ARTICLE III.

OFFENSES AFFECTING PUBLIC SAFETY.

§ 364. It shall be deemed a misdemeanor to do, or cause to be done, any of the following acts ; and any person convicted thereof shall be fined not less than one nor more than fifty dollars :

Driving at dan-
gerous speed.

Animals, same.

Hand car on
sidewalk.

Leaving team
unattended.

Sub. § 1. To ride or drive with unnecessary or dangerous speed in the streets ; to ride or drive any animal or animals at a pace dangerous to life or limb of pedestrians ; or to ride or drive on any of the gutters or sidewalks of the Taxing District ; or propel over or leave standing on the same, any hand car or cart.

Sub. § 2. To leave teams, horses or mules attached to any vehicle standing unhitched on any of

the streets, or the public landing, without a competent person to take charge of the same.

Sub. § 3. To become intoxicated, or go to sleep while driving or in charge of any vehicle on the streets, or public landing of the Taxing District. Driver drunk, or going to sleep

Sub. § 4. To stop any vehicle, or leave the same standing upon the crossings of the streets. Not to stop on crossing.

Sub. § 5. To drive through the streets in so careless a manner as to endanger the vehicles and property of others. Careless driving.

Sub. § 6. To run any engine or train of cars on any railroad running into the District, on which cars are propelled by steam, at a greater speed than six miles an hour within the limits of the District.¹ Steam cars not to run over six miles an hour, where.

Sub. § 7. To fly kites, balloon or balloons, without written permission of the President of the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners,² throw missiles, discharge fireworks, or do any act or make any noise likely to frighten horses or alarm or injure people, or impede the free passage of vehicles or footmen along the streets. Flying kites, balloon, &c

Sub. § 8. To discharge any firearm within the Taxing District, unless in self-defense, or while executing some law. Discharging firearms.

Sub. § 9. To carry concealed on or about the person any pistol, bowie-knife, dirk or other deadly weapon.³ Or to carry any pistol, slung-shot, dangerous knife, or any other deadly weapon of like character at all or in any manner, except in self-defense or while executing some law, or to carry through the streets or other public place in the District, any loaded gun.⁴ Concealed weapons.
