city be found loitering or wandering or loafing about or in any dram shop, saloon, restaurant or any other place, without any visible means of support, and whoever shall be found within this city begging for food or for clothing or money, shall on conviction thereof be fined not less than one nor more than fifty dollars.

SEC. 8. STACKING OF HAY. Whoever shall in this city stack or cause to be stacked any hay or straw or other combustible material on any lot east of Sixth street, or stack or cause to be stacked any hay or straw within one hundred feet of any building, except out houses and stables, shall on conviction therefor be punished by fine not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars.

SEC. 9. SLAUGHTERING ANIMALS. Whoever shall within this city slaughter or cause to be slaughtered any animal between the first day of April and the first day of November or shall within this city deposit or cause to be deposited the carcass of any dead animal or any part thereof on any street, alley, public square or lot, or in the Blue or Kansas rivers, shall on conviction thereof be punished by fine not less than five nor more than fifty dollars.

SEC. 10. FAST RIDING OR DRIVING. Whoever shall within this city ride or drive any horse, mule or other animal faster than the rate of five miles an hour, and whoever shall have any such animal standing in any street, alley or enclosed lot or grounds within this city without hitching the same, shall upon conviction thereof be punished by fine not less than one dollar nor more than twenty-five dollars.

SEC. 11. THE ACCUMULATION OF RUBBISH. Whoever shall within this city allow any accumulation of combustible material such as hay, straw or other material of like character upon any premises under his or her control, or upon any street or alley adjoining such premises, shall on conviction thereof be punished by fine not less than three nor more than fifty dollars.

SEC. 12. CONCEALED WEAPONS AND DISCHARGE OF FIREARMS. Any person who shall within the city carry concealed on his person a pistol, bowie knife, dirk or other deadly weapon, or who shall discharge any firearm, rocket, powder, fireworks or other dangerously combustible material in any street, lot, ground, alley, except for the killing of obnoxious animals on one's own premises, and the killing of birds for scientific purposes, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction fined not less than three nor more than ten dollars.

SEC. 13. TOY PISTOLS. Any person who shall give, trade, loan or otherwise furnish any pistol, revolver or toy pistol by which cartridges or caps may be exploded, or any dirk, bowie knife, sling shot or toy known as "rubber sling shot" or other dangerous weapons, to any minor or to any person of notoriously unsound mind, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall upon conviction before the Police Judge be fined not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars.

SEC. 14. HAVING POSSESSION OF THE SAME. Any minor who shall have in his possession any pistol, revolver, or toy pistol, by which cartridges may be exploded or any dirk, bowie knife, brass knuckles,

slung shot or toy known as "rubber sling shot" or other dangerous weapons shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than one nor more than ten dollars.

SEC. 15. KEEPING OF SWINE AND STOCK YARDS. Any person or persons who shall keep any swine in pens or other stock in stock yards so as to cause any disagreeable smell to arise therefrom within this city, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction fined in any sum not less than three dollars nor more than twenty five dollars.

SEC. 16. OBSTRUCTING RAILROAD CROSSINGS. Whoever shall within this city being an engineer or conductor or other person in charge of a railroad train leave any locomotive or car standing on the railroad track at the crossing of any street, sidewalk or alley longer than five minutes, except in case of an accident, or shall occupy the same for switching or other purpose longer than the time above specified so as to prevent teams, vehicles and foot passengers from crossing such railroad track in safety, shall on conviction be punished by fine not less than five nor more than fifty dollars.

SEC. 17. THROWING UPON STREETS, ETC. Any person who, in this city, shall throw or project any ball, stones, bricks, pieces of wood, clay or other hard substances along, over or upon any street, alley, sidewalk or public grounds or at or against any house, building or vehicle or at or towards any person, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

SEC. 18. VICIOUS ANIMALS. The owner or keeper of any dog or other animal of dangerous and vicious nature, capable of doing personal injury, who shall suffer or permit the same to run at large or escape from his possession, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

SEC. 19. FIRE IN STREETS. It shall be unlawful in this city to burn any shavings, brush, refuse or other combustible materials on any street, alley or public grounds in the night time after ten o'clock, or when the wind is blowing, or nearer than thirty feet from any building when there is no wind; and any person offending under this section shall be fined in a sum not exceeding twenty dollars.

SEC. 20. CHICKENS, PIGEONS, ETC., AT LARGE. It shall be unlawful for the owner, keeper or possessor of any chicken, duck, goose, pigeon or other domestic bird or fowl, to permit or suffer the same to trespass upon the premises of another under a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars.

SEC. 21. CHARIVARI. Whoever shall in this city charivari any person or persons by blowing horns, beating drums, kettles or pans, jingling bells or by any such means as are used at what is commonly called a charivari, shall be fined not less than two nor more than ten dollars.

ARTICLE II.

OFFENSES AGAINST PUBLIC MORALS AND DECENCY.

SECTION 1. INTOXICATING LIQUORS. Any person who shall directly or indirectly sell, barter or give away any intoxicating liquors to an habitual drunkard, or to any intoxicated person, or to any minor, or to
